School Saving Bonus

The School Saving Bonus will provide \$400 in support for Victorian school-aged students in Term 4, 2024 for use on 2025 school costs. The Bonus for Government school students can be accessed via the School Saving Bonus online system in November 2024. Families can choose how they spend the School Saving Bonus. It can be used towards 2025 school costs including uniform, textbooks and more. For eligible non-gov school students - talk to your school about how this cost-of-living support will apply to you. More Health Funding

The Allan Labor Government will always be on the side of our hospitals. Albanese Labor Government is Making it Easier to See a Doctor

I had the opportunity recently to join the Minister for Health and Aged Care - The Hon. Mark Butler MP in opening the 7 additional Medicare Urgent Care Clinics across Victoria.

After nine long years of cuts and neglect under the Liberals and Nationals, the Albanese Labor Government is making Medicare stronger for all Australians.



We have now opened a bulk billed Medicare Urgent Care Clinic in Bayswater.

This clinic will be open 7 days a week with extended hours for all those times you need urgent, but not life-threatening care, from a nurse or doctor, without visiting an emergency room.

We'll keep working to deliver a stronger health care system for all Australians.

In the 2024-25 Budget, the Albanese Government provided \$227 million to expand the Medicare Urgent Care Clinic program.

The seven existing state-funded Priority Primary Care Centres will transition to the Albanese Government's Medicare Urgent Care Clinic network following a request from the Victorian Government.

The clinic will help reduce the number of people attending the local emergency department for urgent, but non-life threatening, conditions like sprains, infections, rashes or cuts.

This is good news for Maroondah Hospital where a third of presentations to the emergency room are for non-urgent and semi-urgent issues.

Over 40% of Medicare Urgent Care Clinic presentations in the state have been outside standard business hours which means the clinics are filling an important gap in services across extended hours and over the weekend.

And with one in four visits treating a young person under 15, the Victorian clinics are giving families timely health care and peace of mind.

Located at Mountain High Shopping Centre, 7-13 High Street, Bayswater, the Maroondah Medicare Urgent Care Clinic is open 8am-10pm every day.

Funding For Local Roads and Community **Infrastructure Priorities**

The Albanese Labor Government continues to boost the liveability of communities across Aston with road and community infrastructure projects progressing and increased funding to support a pipeline of future local priority projects.

Working in partnership with Knox City Council, projects funded by the Albanese Government are improving the safety of local road networks, supporting local jobs, and unlocking new social and economic opportunities.

Over \$6,449,559 in Roads to Recovery (RTR) funding will flow to Knox City Council over the next five years, a boost of \$\$2,785,050 thanks to the Albanese Government.

Through Phase 4 of the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) program, Knox City Council is also receiving \$732,902 for local priority projects.

This includes the Bayswater Oval Cricket Nets Renewal at Marie Wallace Bayswater Park and the Knox BMX Track Renewal in Knoxfield.

This will support enhanced experiences for teams when training and improve accessibility and use of facilities across all weather conditions.

Nationally, the Albanese Government is delivering significant funding increases to support local councils progress their priority projects.

The Roads to Recovery program is progressively increasing from \$500 million to \$1 billion per year, the Road Black Spot Program is increasing to \$150 million per year, and \$50 million has been added to the new \$200 million per year Safer Local Roads and Infrastructure Program.

Ten years later, Phillip Johnson re-created this garden, bigger by a massive twenty times. The result is spectacular, and the native habitats and biodiversity created are stunning.

Meandering through the garden, even the most proficient gardeners in our club were stunned, inspired and impressed by the landscaping and the myriad of plants on display. The non-gardeners of the group could not believe that such an interesting garden could exist, let alone thrive!

As the years go by and the plants grow, this garden will be a gem of the Dandenong Ranges and well worth a visit.

New AJM President by Ken Simpson-Bull OAM

The Australian Jazz Museum's long-time president Terry Norman has retired after 11 years in the role. During his tenure Terry's many achievements included the creation of the AJM's current mission statement (as cited in the sub-heading above), successfully obtaining extensive philanthropic grants from the Potter Foundation for museum projects, negotiating with the AJM's landlord, Parks Victoria, in obtaining a 21-year lease of the museum's property and permission to extend its outbuildings and obtaining the services of renowned jazz musician James Morrison AM as the AJM's official Patron.

Terry's successor is the relatively recent volunteer lan Rutherford whose previous experience as a musician and in the recording and streaming of popular music is being extensively utilised. Already lan has been responsible for the introduction of the streaming of various albums in the "Live @ AJM" YouTube music link (also available from Spotify and other popular streaming services) which features jazz performances recorded at the museum's group visits.

lan has also provided audio playlists of rare jazz music from the museum's extensive collection which can be accessed from the AJM's website by clicking on the piano image. Ian is also working on extending the museum's video interview series which is accessible via "Our Collections" on the AJM's website. The future series is expected to include musical examples of the interviewees' performances. Ian recently appeared as guest on Radio Eastern FM's Friday night jazz program as well as on Inner FM's "That's Jazz" presented by George Krupinski. He is hoping to be heard again on future broadcasts where he can present more rare iazz from the museum's vaults. The AJM is fortunate to have obtained the services of such an enthusiastic new president.

Meeting - August

Speaker: Alex Stalder "Plants of the Victorian High Country"

Alex has a house at Dinner Plain, as a result she developed an interest in the area but mainly in the vegetation and the beautiful alpine flowers found there.

Alex explained about the altitudinal zones: lower elevations to about 900 metres, montane to about 1500 metres, subalpine at 1600 metres and alpine at 1800 metres.

Also, there are areas up in the high country that are very cold and can have snow all year round. At the subalpine level the Snow Gums dominate. Alpine bog is found there, and that is a really important ecosystem. At the moment it is being threatened by feral horses and deer.


Alex, in her presentation, showed us many beautiful images taken on Lake Mountain, the Baw Baw Plateau, Mt Buller, Mt Stirling, Mt Hotham, Dinner Plain, and Falls Creek. Her images showed grasses and trees found in each area as well as orchids, mosses and many varieties of flowers.

There are challenges including extremely short growing seasons, strong winds, snow and ice. Most of the plants that grow in these areas are perennials. There is not enough time for annuals to develop.

Twenty-one members attended on a lovely sunny morning where we wandered on both sides of the Mullum Mullum Creek. Walking on one side there was little in the way of orchids but on the weedier side there were a few different orchids to be found. Being wattle season there was quite a variety of indigenous plants in full flower. Surprisingly for a suburban area, around 30 different birds were recorded.

The birdlife was varied with bush birds and water birds seen throughout the park. A sighting of a mistletoe bird and Diamond Firetail finches made the day complete.

Knox Environment Society - Pre-Spring in the Garden by Anne Morton

"Spring is Nature's way of saying 'Let's Party'" – Robin Williams

And nothing is more true at this time of year as many plants, particularly the wattles, celebrate Spring by covering themselves in flowers.

The party started a little while ago with the flowering of the Silver Wattle, soon followed by the Golden Wattle, Blackwood and, when in flower, the glorious Hedge Wattle. And that's just an indigenous sample of the many flowering plants seen in parks and reserves now.

Myrtle Wattle Acacia myrtifolia (pictured top right)

In the garden the Myrtle Wattle soon covered itself in its profuse yellow flowers. This is a useful as well as colourful plant flowering between July and October and happy to grow in most soils in full sun to full shade. Growing from 1 to 3 metres it will provide a fast-growing low screen. Pruning is beneficial.

Gold Dust Wattle Acacia acinacea (pictured bottom right)

Also covering itself in bright yellow balls is the Gold Dust Wattle. This is an open spreading shrub blooming prolifically between July and November. Adaptable to well drained soils, in full sun to semi-shade, it is a good low screening plant which will often self-seed in the garden. Annual pruning will keep it in shape.





Purple Coral Pea Hardenbergia violacea (pictured below)

For a change of colour, you can't go past the beautiful Purple Coral Pea. This is a showy, scrambling climber that can be useful for covering embankments or as a light screen. It is another adaptable plant, comfortable in well drained soils, either in full sun or semi-shade, although sunnier positions will usually result in better flowering.

Knox Community Gardens Society Where Our Community Can Grow

We are celebrating our 40th Birthday on Saturday 5th October 2024 from 10am to 4pm at 51 Kleinert Rd Boronia – free event all welcome!

In July 1984 a Commonwealth Employment Program was established to create a vineyard, orchard and community garden and to provide horticultural employment and training. In October 1984 Knox Community Garden was established as a cooperative and 62 plots were allocated to members of the local community. So here we are, 40 years later, still going strong. We now have over 150 plots of various sizes so we have grown significantly since our establishment.

Laughter Yoga together (or even alone) contributes to our feelings of Worthiness

Hello Friends,

Our topic today is Worthiness. Do you consciously focus on a desire to be a worthy person? It can also be an unconscious activity driven by an internal desire where we yearn to feel better about ourselves. In trying to be a 'good' person and nice to others, we may be driven by an inner desire for worthiness within ourselves. Behaviours we are told to live by may have actually caused us to become passive and supress our true feelings. Being a 'good' person may have been at our own expense when we uplift and look after others, we may neglect or forget about our own self-care. Much comes about through behavioural patterns and conditioning as we are growing up, influences from the beliefs and backgrounds of our parents and people who are in authority in our lives. Our feelings of self-worth can become reduced and we develop into being a people pleaser. This is commonly more related to the females amongst us, or men with a strong feminine nature. Ideally, we will reach a stage where our worthiness is not dependent upon the opinions of others.

How does laughter yoga and laughter club contribute to increased feelings of worthiness?

As laughter works on all aspects of our bodies, physical, emotional, mental and spiritual, we can embrace the activity of laughing together, releasing our own inhibitions, judgment of others and selfjudgment.

Laughter yoga is a stress releaser which energises us, taking us out of our critical left-brain analytical thought patterns as we embrace our creative right brain hemisphere expression. Naturally this will be limited by our personalities as some people are doing it tough mentally, finding it harder than others to let go and relax into the laughter exercises.

Usually over time, or perhaps straight away, we feel better about ourselves and our life. After the regular



Ferntree Gully Laughter Club sessions we continue the social interaction heading over to Rapture Café for a cuppa where we share with our laughter friends what we've been up to within the close-knit community.

Do you need to come on a regular basis?

Many people have very busy lives and attend a laughter session spasmodically. It is worth coming along for a visit and to try it out once, twice or three times to see if it is a good fit for you or not. Laughter yoga is also a great aerobic exercise and recently a few members share how they are managing to include it in their lives in different ways. People even go through a regular daily routine as an exercise option, incorporating the deep breathing and affirmations that we do.

Gently and over time involvement in laughter sessions can help us enormously in our lives to cope and feel good about ourselves and clearer about our lives.

To make them powerful, we say them out loud and with conviction.

- 1. I Have Lots of Ideas, Life Inspires Me!
- 2. I Am, You Are, We Are Amazing!
- 3. I Am So Enthusiastic!
- 4. I Am in Love With Life!
- 5. I, You, We Can Do This!

Repeating worthiness affirmations helps us be positive creating positive behaviour changes and, at the same time, we will feel more in tune with life. Our



What Are Corns And **Callousities?**

Corns and callousities are additional layers of skin produced as a body defence to protect underlying tissues against friction and pressure. The presence of a centre suggests a corn has formed. If the cause of pressure is not relieved calluses and corns can become painful and even ulcerate. Common sites of corn and callus formation, including the ball of the foot, under the big toe, tips and tops of toes and between the toes.

Sometimes 'soft' corns between toes can also form.



Do I Have ADHD?

According to a rating scale from the World Health Organisation the following are some symptoms of ADHD:

- Trouble wrapping up the final details of projects
- Difficulty with tasks that require organisation
- Problems remembering appointments or obligations •
- Avoid or delay getting started on tasks
- Difficulty with concentration
- Feeling overly active and compelled to do things

If you have four or more of the symptoms above you may have ADHD and could benefit from intervention. ADHD is a largely genetically acquired neurobehavioural condition impacting at least 5% of the population. It causes difficulty with concentration and task completion making study and work difficult for many, along with problems in organisation, time management, procrastination and self-regulation.

Dr Steve Dawson, a Clinical Psychologist of more than 35 years' experience, is an expert in diagnostic testing for and management of ADHD in adults, teens and children. His PhD thesis many years ago was on the neuropsychology of ADHD and he has assessed many hundreds of people for this condition. He also offers psychological strategies for adults and teens as well as help for parents of children with ADHD. He uses a range of assessments including neurocognitive testing to assess for the disorder. Treatment can involve behavioural and cognitive behavioural therapy (CBT) as well as referral to medical specialists for medical treatment. Dr Dawson also sees adults for psychological treatment of anxiety, stress and depression.

EACH Financial Counselling by Bridget Morcom

Do you have an overdue gas, water or electricity bill?

You may eligible for a Victorian government grant.... URGS – Utility Relief Grant Scheme

What is the Utility Relief Grant?

A Victorian government grant for households who pay for mains water, gas and/or electricity and are struggling to pay those bills. It can help reduce outstanding utility debts or pay some of your bills to help you keep on top of them.

Am I eligible?

Yes, if you:

- have a Pensioner or Healthcare card or a Veterans Affairs Gold card.
- or are on a low income (limits are based on household size and income)
- have utility bill overdue

How much will I get?

A maximum of \$650 per utility type. That is \$650 for each - water, gas and for electricity. You have two years to use up the grant before you can apply again. The grant directly reduces your utility bills. It is not given as cash.

How do I apply?

By calling your water, gas or electricity retailers and saying that you will struggle to pay your bill and wish to apply for the 'Utility Relief Grant'. They will ask some questions to check if you are eligible for the grant and you can request to complete the application over the phone.

What do I need?

Your name to be on the utility bill and the amount overdue. You will need your Centrelink reference number, or a payslip, and to be able to explain why you are struggling financially (for example: out of pocket medical bills, accommodation cost is more than 30% of income, one-off large expenses, family violence, decrease in income etc)

Once your application is completed it will take 4-6 weeks to be processed. During this time, you may still receive statements from your provider, however you will not be chased for any debts.

Here is an example: If you have a utility bill owing of \$1000 the URGS

grant of \$650 will go directly towards this leaving you with \$350 left to pay.

However, if you have a bill owing of \$200, when the grant is approved \$200 of the \$650 will directly pay the entire amount overdue. You then have another \$450 left that you can put towards a future bill so long as it is within two years. You can choose which bill to use it for. Some people prefer to save it for their higher winter invoices.

If you are unsure if you are eligible, call your utility retailer and they can check for you. For more information phone your retailer, or call 1800 658 521.

Cost of Living Bites Victoria's Pets

RSPCA Victoria reports show cost-of-living pressures impact thousands of animals across the state.

Those unable to afford veterinary care and those no longer able to afford the costs of providing for their pets are just some of the struggles RSPCA Victoria's Inspectors are seeing first-hand.

In the last 12 months 2,250 animals were seized by or surrendered to RSPCA Victoria's Inspectorate placing pressure on the capacity of shelter services.

Nearly 10,000 animal cruelty reports were made to RSPCA Victoria by members of the public in the 2023-24 financial year with the top reasons including:

1.Husbandry issues: such as lack of grooming, poor hygiene or unsanitary living conditions, no farrier attendance, lack of shearing etc.

2.Underweight animals

3.Sick/injured animals where there has been insufficient, or no veterinary treatment provided

Acting Chief Inspector Michelle Green said while malicious cruelty was still occurring their team was helping struggling pet owners more than ever before. "It's an increasingly challenging environment out there following the pressures of the pandemic and the cost-of-living crisis is only compounding this.



"The majority of what our RSPCA Inspectors are seeing first-hand is just how much people in the community are struggling, and when people are struggling their pets are often affected.

"The majority of the animal cruelty we see is actually neglect as a result of people's circumstances changing beyond their control, such as hospitalisation, financial pressures, or sudden joblessness, while other animals suffered due to owners simply not understanding how to care for their pets adequately. "When they can, our Inspectors are offering help through emergency pet food to struggling households and other support such as the provision of donated kennels or bedding for pets and providing preventative flea and worming treatments. "We're also seeing people struggling to provide for the number of animals they have, whether that be households caring for unplanned litters from undesexed pets or people whose circumstances have changed and they're no longer able to support their pets.

"If you are struggling to care for your pets you are not alone, please don't be afraid to reach out for help and please don't wait until your pet is suffering.

"People can reach out to us, to other communitybased programs, to their local council or other groups that may be able to provide support."

This year RSPCA Victoria announced it is increasing its community outreach work as part of its 2030 Strategy, with the aim of supporting people in the community to keep and care for their pets so that they don't end up in shelters.


